EDITOR'S NOTE

Welcome to *Trolley* No 15. With this issue being the first of 1996 may I begin by wishing all members the very best for 1996.

Since the last edition of trolley there have been a number of changes within the organisational side of Summerlee. The Heritage Trust no longer has trust status and has been fully integrated with Monklands District Council. It will be absorbed into the new North Lanarkshire Council from 1 April when local government reorganisation takes place in Scotland. The Trust's name has now been changed to Summerlee Museum. The main effect this will have on the Transport Group will be that our funding should come from the new council via Summerlee (hopefully)

NEWS

OPERATIONS

Throughout the Winter the service has been operated by either 225 or 9062 depending on car availability. 53 was officially withdrawn from service for the winter so that essential maintenance can take place.

TRAMCARS

Lanarkshire 53 There has been tremendous progress with the outstanding brasswork on this car. Members have stripped one controller for overhaul and the braking system is also being overhauled

Graz 225 New tube lighting has been ordered from OSRAM in Germany. Quotes have been obtained for a replacement fuse box as spares for the original are becoming impossible to obtain. 225 has been unavailable for service during early 1996 due to these fuse problems.

Glasgow 1017 Work has virtually ground to a halt on this car as we have no members available with the relevant skills. If you have

ANY woodworking skills, no matter how little, your help is greatly needed for this project.

Bruxelles 9062 was having problems with its brake shoes. These seem to have been rectified and 9062 is the only car available for service with 225 out of action.

DEPOT COMPOUND

The area next to the depot has been drastically cleared so that when the tram shed is extended there will be less work required.

A 40 foot container has been obtained by the Museum on our behalf. This will be used to store various spares and artefacts which there is little room for in the depot.

DEPOT

A safety trip switch has been fitted to the 240V ring in the depot. 'Lye Live' light boxes are being fitted at the rear of the depot. Pigeons are once again causing problems in the depot. A permanent solution is being sought.

EX-LISBON TRUCKS

The three trucks currently stored from Lisbon have been moved from the Conservation Workshop to the outside end of the Exhibition Hall. They are covered in a strong tarpaulin.

HORSETRAM

The horsetram has been moved from the exhibition hall to the boatshop where there is specialist equipment to deal with the bodywork.

POTENTIAL ACQUISITIONS

Negotiations are still ongoing regarding acquiring Glasgow Works Car 21, currently at the National Tramway Museum at Crich. Further details will be given when known.

MEMBERSHIP

Membership renewal forms for 1996 were issued early in February. If you have not already done so please forward these to the membership secretary as soon as possible.

MOTORSCHOOL

Mike Chalton has been taking a number of Summerlee's Visitors Services staff through the Motorschool to enable them to cover days when then the Group has no Motormen available.

TRAMWAY MODELLING GROUP

The group continue to meet each Wednesday evening in the portacabin inside the tram depot compound at 7.30 pm.

All the original rails were lifted at the end of last year and new rails have now been laid. Overhead has been added and grass laid where there are no roads or buildings. The systems operated considerably better with the new trackwork.

It is planned to open the layout to the public at special events and a smaller layout is planned for attending outside events.

As usual new members are always extremely welcome to the model group.

PERMANENT WAY

Following quotes received concerning a number of areas of track Summerlee has lifted the setts around the concerned areas in anticipation of correction work beginning. When this task is complete it should remove all of the bad joints in the track.

MUSEUM NEWS

At the Hornock Colliery display a coal screening and bagging plant has been constructed at the pit-head complex. The structure is based on a similar one formerly at Spoutcroft mine near Newhouse. Gardens have been added on the land behind the two storey miners rows featuring four periods between 1900 and the present day. The grassed land adjacent to this will feature the 'Jubilee' fountain originally from Dunbeth Park in Coatbridge.

A new entrance gate has been created to help feed visitors through the shop highlighting the fact that they must buy their tickets there before they can board the tram. It is eventually planned to use the small cottage at the bottom of Heritage Way as the entrance and this is being worked on at present.

The tearoom now located in the old meeting room in the Ironworks Gallery and is considerably larger with a bigger menu. The old tearoom is now the conference room where meetings are now held. The sawmill site next to the tram stop has been cleared in preparation for the display of woodworking machinery and the erection of a timber drying shed.

A stairway is being constructed at the side of the canal bridge (depot end) to the canal tow path. A large number of workers on a government supported scheme are working on this and other projects around the site.

WEATHER STOPS WORK ON TRAMWAY

Work on extending the Birkenhead Tramway can to a standstill last month because of the freezing weather that had affected most of Britain.

Project engineer Bill Blackburn said "We couldn't do anything this week because it was too cold to pour concrete. We're about three weeks behind."

The existing 370 metre track, between the Pacific Road Transport Transport Museum and Woodside, is proving to be a popular weekend attraction.

The extension will add another 420-metre of track taking it as far as the Egerton Dock Bridge.

Traction poles bearing the Birkenhead coat of arms are already in place and holes have been dug to take the foundation plinths which will support the rails.

Further extensions are envisaged to take the track out to Birkenhead Park and round in a loop back to Woodside via Conway Park and Hamilton Square.

NORTH WALES TRAMWAY RESTORATION ... UPDATE


Members may remember the article in Trolley No 10 (July 1994) in which we told of the Llandudno and Colwyn Bay Electric Railway Society and its restoration of Northampton car 21. In a newsletter I received from my Merseyside correspondent, Alf Jacob, who has recently reached the grand age of 90 - Congratulations!, I have learned that this society has decided to disband due to lack of progress on the restoration of 21. The car has been sold to a Mr Harvey in Kent for £1,000, who intends to use 21 to help him build an almost identical car, Colchester 10. He hopes to obtain trucks and controllers from Lisbon. He eventually hopes to run the car at the east Anglia Tramway Museum, Lowestoft.

Visitors can still visit the site at Tal-y-Cafn, which now owned by the newly resurrected North Wales Tramway Museum Assoc., on most Saturday afternoons. The site houses a fifteen inch gauge railway, Southend Pier car No.7, a Bristol LHS bus and there are plans to bring Bournemouth car No. 7 from a nearby factory for further restoration.

The former newsletter of the LL & CB ERS, *Trolleypole* is being continued as a private venture with any profits going to tramway restoration. Further details can be obtained from Trolleypole Publications, 119 High Street, Bangor, Gwynedd, LL15 1NT.

THE WEST YORKSHIRE TRANSPORT EXPERIENCE

For a number of years there have been plans afoot to develop a Transport Museum with a difference on the outskirts of Bradford. The West Yorkshire Transport Museum Trust was founded by the local County Council in 1984 who would provide the bulk of the funding for the project and subsidise the operation. The Trust acquired 26 acres of former railway land south of Bradford and 5.5 miles of the disused Spen Valley Railway. A major stumbling block was the abolition of the CC in 1986. The new local councils were supportive of the new project but were unable to provide the necessary financial backing. Furthermore the reduction in grant aid made the need for private sector funding even greater.

Consultant architects and planners who had experience with Garden Festivals and other leisure projects were appointed to report on the feasibility of the proposals.

The Transport Centre has an excellent location adjacent to the M62 with some 9 million potential visitors within 90 minutes driving time.

The Centre will focus not only on the Transport of the past, but will include the present and future as well.

Construction work began on the main buildings in early 1994 and the centre opened in mid-1995 under the imaginative title of 'Transperience'.

The main concept of the Centre is that the displays are cross referenced so that the visitor will be encouraged to move and explore from one to another, creating movement which relates to the concept of the interchange and to the on site ride apportunities offers to visitors. The 'transport story' is examined on an issue basis rather than the more conventional chronological or technological perspective.

The historic transport network is known as the Translink system, where vintage Buses, Trolleybuses from Bradford and Sweden and Hungarian Trams transport you around the park. Modern technology allows you to drive a tram, trolleybus, motorbus or train

on vehicle simulators. You can even try your hand at changing rail or road signals and there is the ultimate 'feelie' box where you try and identify items.

In the Visitor Centre you can discover how the Park was built and you can purchase souvenirs in the well stocked shop. The Concourse Building houses the 'Moving On' and 'Shock of the New' displays which includes how different forms of transport are powered and you can re-live the shock of 'new' inventions like steam trains and how important they were to people who used them and other new events like the dawning of the tram and eventually the trolleybus and you can see what the future holds for transport. The Concourse Building also houses the Gallery restaurant and gift shop.

In the Auditorium you can watch and listen to the conductor as he attempts to keep control of the passengers on his bus. You can sit back and enjoy the clips giving a humorous insight into public transport vehicles and their roles in television and films through the ages.

In the Exploratory you can find out what makes it go and you can try one of the driving simulators. There is also a cafe in this area.

At the tram terminus there is a childrens adventure park and a picnic area.

All of the vehicles are maintained and restored in the on-site Workshop, which is unfortunately not open to the public.

The museum is easy to reach by road or public transport and is open daily except Christmas and Boxing Day 10am-5.30pm summer and 10.30am-4.30pm winter. Telephone Transperience on (01274) 690909 for further details

BLACKPOOL TRAMS

PART ONE 1885-1961

THE history of Blackpool Trams part one 1885–1961. Blackpool has one of the oldest tramways in the world; the oldest in Britain; and the only surviving first generation tramway on the mainland. For over a century, its trams have catered for residents as well as holiday-makers, and its fleet of illuminated trams has excited worldwide acclaim. However, during its life, the system has had to survive many trials and tribulations including the threat of total closure. The selection of films (much in colour) depicts Blackpool's trams including most types in action at key locations. Early footage includes a conduit operating Dreadnought, the first electric cars in Lytham, the building of the re-aligned prom, and of course the illuminated trams. The tape is silent with commentry, no added trams sounds.
