As previously mentioned in Trolley the responsibility for the operation of Summerlee Museum has passed to North Lanarkshire Council. One of the Councils' first decisions was to implement admission charges to the museum (Adults £2, Children/Passport to Leisure Holders £1). Members should always bring their membership cards (enclosed) with them when visiting Summerlee to gain free entry. The introduction of admission charges means that there is no longer a separate charge for the Tramway.

NEWS

OPERATIONS

The traction service has been provided by 9062 throughout the Spring. 53 was returned to service in April, after its winter overhaul, in time for the various spring school holidays.

TRAMCARS

Lanarkshire 53 As stated above has returned to service and is used on days where there is the sufficient staff and the weather is suitable.

Graz 225 has remained out of service since the last newsletter as there are still problems with the emergency magnetic track brake. A new fuse box has been fitted with easily obtainable fuses.

Glasgow 1017 Work has now resumed on 1017. Rot has been discovered on parts of the ceiling and roof. There are holes where there has been knots which have fallen out of the wood. The wood supporting the No 1 end platform windows also needs replacing. These tasks are currently being attended to.

Bruxelles 9062 new brake shoes have been fitted which have been cast in chilled iron. These will, hopefully, last longer than previous shoes and their performance is being monitored.

Brussels car 9062 has been fitted with a new top pantograph strip. The STG were asked to help carry out trials on a new carbon-composite material which might be used to replace existing carbon strips on trams and electric locos, EMUs, etc.

The new assembly does away with the top backing bar as it has its own bonded frame together with alloy end horns. the whole unit is secured by only 4 nuts making it very quick and easy to change when worn. Close watch is being kept on it to see how it performs.

DEPOT COMPOUND

Our new 40' container has been filled with various tram spares and acquisitions.

DEPOT

Various items have been obtained from the former depots of Kelvin Central Buses at Stepps and Kirkintilloch. Negotiations are continuing to obtain equipment from Old Kilpatrick which has also recently closed.

PERMANENT WAY

A permanent way contractor is awaiting clearance from Summerlee Museum before work can start on correcting the bad trackwork, this would amongst other things require the curve between the canal bridge and depot points to be moved out a further 18" than present. This would then require adjustments to the overhead in this area.

OVERHEAD Mike Chalton

For once the sun was actually shining when Brian Quinn and I carried out some adjustments on the overhead during the first week in May. It is usually horizontal rain or sub-zero temperatures when aloft! Certain line ears (the 'clamps' that grip the grooved trolley wire) were no longer vertical on curved sections. No problem with pantograph cars but cause dewirements at speed with No. 53's trolley.

The worst section was at the canal bridge around the depot curve. Part of the problem is that the 'Parafil' span rope (plastic sheathed

nylon filament) slowly stretches. Adjustment has been previously made with turnbuckles but stretching continues. Several tramway undertakings have discarded this material and gone back to using conventional span wire, sometimes with stainless fittings.

Whilst up aloft, messrs. Chalton and Quinn wielded the wire brush, paint and paint brushes (first time for everything - Edl) continuing the painting of fittings that had to be abandoned because of snow in January. The opportunity was taken to replace a damaged finial on a traction pole near the depot. That leaves only another 1,346 jobs to do!!

EX-LISBON TRUCKS

The Group is currently awaiting action from the museum management to enable regauging and overhaul of the truck(s).

POTENTIAL ACQUISITIONS

No further details are available as yet regarding Glasgow Works Car 21, currently at the National Tramway Museum at Crich. discussions are currently being sought with Summerlee Museum regarding the long term loan of this car.

MEMBERSHIP

Members are reminded that they must carry their membership cards when visiting the Museum at all times, especially during opening hours, where the card must be shown to avoid the admission fee.

FIRST AID COURSE

Further details will hopefully be available from the Museum regarding this course. If you are interested there is still time to contact a member of the committee to register.

MOTORSCHOOL

Some Summerlee Visitor Services staff were progressing through the motorschool but this has been suspended due to staff reorganisation and rationalisation.

Railman Bob flies off with three parrots to pastures new

Look who's a clever

RAILMAN Bob Docherty has gone abroad for a new job, new home and new challenges.

And he has taken his three pet parrots with him. Bob is working for Stagecoach but his responsibilities are a world apart from that of South West Trains staff whose franchise was won by the bus group last January.

Bob, 42, has left his public affairs job with Railtrack Scotland to bring a historic Portuguese tram system back to life.

Stagecoach recently took over the eight-mile line at Sintra, north of Lisbon, appointing Bob its project manager.

It will be his task to oversee the rejuvenation of the disused track and 93-year-old trams. most of which have been mothballed for 25 years.

Advantage

Two miles of line have been used for seasonal tourist trips since 1980, but Stagecoach plans to introduce all-year commuter services using the old trams alongside newer ones transferred from Lisbon.

Bob reckons that his 18 years railway experience plus his flu-

ency in Portuguese - he has visited the country more than 40 times - will be a great advantage in his new job.

He moved from Strathclyde passenger transport executive to BR's Scottish Region civil engineers' department in 1978, going on to the regional operations department in 1980 and to public affairs a year later.

In April, 1994, Bob moved to Railtrack public affairs.

permits for depot visits to organising promotions, open days and helping to make feature films.

He reckons the greatest time was the 1980s launch of ScotRail under then general manager Chris Green.

He says of his movies involvement that his biggest job was in making of "Mission

His duties ranged from issuing Impossible" starring Tom Cruise, helping to organise a special train, although he never met the actor.

Challenge

Both as professional and volunteer. Bob has been involved with the restoration of trams and trains at the Crich tramway museum, Derbys, and at a heritage park at Coatbridge, central Scotland.

The new Job may be quite a challenge, but so was moving from Glasgow to Portugal especially the travel arrangements for his pets.

He says: "I am looking forward to it, once the hassle of moving is out of the way."

Bob had to get export licences and health certificates from the ministry of agriculture, fisheries and food before he could take the three birds and that meant ploughing through red tape.

"I wanted to take them by train but Eurostar won't allow live animals through the Channel tunnel. I thought about taking the ferry but I doubt if any hotel in Paris would have put three parrots up for the night.


In the end, Bob and parrots went by plane.

BIRKENHEAD TRAMWAY EXTENSION

On 29/4/96 I had the privilee of being on the first tram to traverse the new extension from the Pacific Road Depot to Egerton Bridge via Shore Road. Originally, the purpose of the visit was to see Peter Price of "Peter Price Electrical" to have a look at some of the overhead fittings he manufactures. The previous evening he had completed stringing the trolley wire from the depot to the end of the line. The track was completed a few days earlier. Both the track and the overhead were "Eye Sweet" indeed a joy to behold.

HM Railway inspectorate were checking the track and the overhead on the day of my visit for approval for public operation. After being introduced to Steven Firth (HMI), Bob the Motorman, representatives from Wirral Borough Council, Highways Dept., yours truly awaited the track cleaning to be completed before one of the Hong Kong built cars was brought out. Tarmac was still being laid flush with the rails but just as much seemed to be left in the grooves. The tarmac contractors speedily removed this with a compressor (road drill variety) towed behind a van and an open hose tied to an old broom handle. Very effective! It blasted stones and tarmac many yards at a frightening velocity - all this in front of the H.S.E! Not to worry. rail Blasting completed, it was time to bring the tram out. The first run was done at less than walking pace with the inspector watching every inch of progress both on the deck and up aloft. With brand shiny-new trolley wire with a carbon pick-up head, not a hint of a spark was seen from the overhead. The return current to the track was a different matter though. It appeared that not even a platelayers trolley had been down the track before the tram, so we were treated to a free firework display every time it notched up. The new passing loop has spring-back single blade points and spring-return frogs. No problem here. Clearance was a bit tight at a couple of places where, on a curve, the overhang of the car was a bit too close to the kerbside. It will be the kerb that will be moved over - not the track.

The track to Egerton Bridge crosses from the river side of Shore Road to the landward side about halfway along. The angle of the crossing has been made fairly sharp. The roadway has also been modified so that road traffic crosses the tramway at almost 90 degrees. The reason being to give the motorman a clear field of both ways before crossing. No traffic signals have been installed on this section. Inductive loop traffic lights are already existing between Woodside Ferry and the depot. At the new terminus lurks a sand drag.

I had earlier had a close look at the overhead with Peter Price in his nicely restored Bradford Trolleybus overhead repair wagon. As previously mentioned, he makes his own overhead fittings and good they are too. Modern materials are used but to an older type design - so they "look right". He also uses certain "K&M" Swiss fittings, mainly line ears and pulloffs. Under new regulations triple insulation (not double) is the order of the day. Therefore all sidearm poles have to be insulated from the traction pole. A threaded block of plastic-type material is interposed where the side pole meets the main traction pole. The stay wire above also has an insulator inserted.

These new regulations mean of course that any new extension that may be built at Summerlee will not be able to use any scrollwork on the poles - unless we can make the omate bits out of plastic?? A quick check with the "Megger" showed virtually no current leakage over the entire system - even after several heavy showers of rain. Peter seemed well pleased, as was the inspector. If you want to see immaculate trackwork and perfect overhead then Birkenhead's the place to visit! (as well as Summerlee! - Ed).

Many thanks to all the friendly folk I met who allowed me to intrude on what must have been an anxious day.

Driving in Style SUMMERLEE AT BLACKPOOL

ON a cold winter snowy night in March, 6 members (Paul Geissler, Ronnie McLean, Douglas and Ross Scouler, Bill Tollan and Jimmy and Duncan White) made their way to Blackpool for another Busman's Holiday. After a good night's sleep and a hearty breakfast at 7 a.m. we made our way to the tram depot (we had to report at 8 a.m.) where we were greeted by Tom Moody the Inspector and our Instructor. Our party was joined by Keith Terry, a very knowledgeable tramway man.

We had a short talk on the Blackpool system and then off for a "shot" of a Balloon-quite a big tramcar. The controller was of such that after notching up the handle must be brought back slightly before going on to the next notch and so on right up to top parallel. This is so you cannot notch up to quickly. It was quite a thrill to drive through Fleetwood with other traffic and pedestrians—most of them gave us a clear path.

The next car out was a Trailer-set and we were driving from the trailer-end, it was so very silent as all the "works" were in the driving car. The instructor suggested to turn in the loop at Little Bispham but discovered we didn't have a point changer on the car, (who did the checks before we took it out of the depot?) but noticed a builder's yard opposite and a piece of metal was found and this did the trick. Blackpool's points are changed differently as the lever goes in the middle of the track.

The third car was a Centenary car-very easy to control-one lever does all, forward and the car eases slowly away and to accelerate just keep pushing it forward, to brake pull the lever toward you -and that's it.

Some of the members wanted to by a car but had to make do with a model one - come and see them on our model layout at Summerlee.

We had a short test and presented with a certificate-even Jimmy got one for being a good and patient dog on the tram. Our thanks go to Bill Tollan who arranged this with Blackpool Corporation and also the Hotel accommodation.





Blackpool Trams In Action

FROM the producers of Tramtrax Magazine comes Tramtrax Video. This, the first video in a series of tapes, shows the Blackpool Tram fleet of today. People often wonder how many trams there are, what they're like and where they go – well this is it.

The video opens with a five minute music backed introduction to the Blackpool fleet, showing all the different trams of the fleet. After that it's six minutes of OMO cars, 5, 10 and 11 (possibly their last season?) in action. Next its the five Open Boat cars followed by a 12 minute sequence of Brush cars which includes a journey following 623 through Rossall. A break from the tram fleet follows next with a look at the incredible August flooding. After the floods come the Centenary cars-all eight which includes a lineside journey with 642. Twin-cars mostly filmed racing through Rossall are next and after them the three Ex-Towing cars showing 680 in its first season back in service. A break from the action for a night time derailment involving 647 follows next. A 15 minute sequence on Balloon cars come after 647 followed by the Jubilee, Illuminated and Vintage cars. The final sequence to music shows trams at night, filmed during the Illuminations and includes footage of a rare journey by the Illuminated Train to Fleetwood

The tape was filmed during the Summer, Autumn and Winter of 1992 and shows the trams at work in all conditions. Locations for filming vary from the Promenade at Pleasure Beach and Tower right through to the open fields of Rossall and Broadwater – a true picture of the Blackpool Tramway in the 1990s.

GROUDLE GLEN RAILWAY -


ONE HUNDRED YEARS OLD

Where the \$*%! is Groudle Glen I hear you say! Well beautiful Groudle Glen lies just to the north of Onchan on the Isle of Man. It was created by the Victorians as a pleasure park complete with waterwheel (remember now!) A 2ft gauge railway line linked the glen with the clifftop zoo. After falling into disuse, the line has now been lovingly restored by enthusiasts and extended to its original length, the last section re-opening in 1992.

Built in 1896, the line climbs from the seclusion of the wooded glen before bursting onto the clifftops with magnificent views out to sea. Services are normally hauled by the original steam loco 'Sea Lion' which is supplemented on occasion by diesel loco.




Sea Lion at Groudle Glen Railway
