# Chairman's Chat

August was a busy month for the Group. Our long overdue Open Evening was a great success. All who wished a shot of turning the handles were given the opportunity under the watchful eyes of Bob Sutherland and Ronnie Maclean who gave instruction on 53 and 225 respectively. It was very pleasing to meet again some of the old Thursday night gang who took this opportunity to meet David Sloan our Tramway technician, some indicating they will become involved again once as time permits. Refreshments in the depot were organised by John Traynor and his wife, sustaining members and friends as they inspected ongoing work in the depot. The opportunity was also given to inspect initial plans for the re-development of the main exhibition hall. A raffle was run which financed the evening and brought an extra smile to an Aberdonian and a party from Edinburgh. Thank you to all who turned up making this a very enjoyable evening and especially to David Sloan for allowing the night to run on long after the normal finishing time.

### STEAM FAIR

The other big event of the month was the Steam and Model Fair. Douglas Boyle covered the tram on Saturday, Bob Sutherland and Andy Jamieson taking command on the Sunday. Ronnie Maclean and Duncan White gave their portable 'O' Gauge layout an airing in the Main Hall. This is a very impressive layout which is worth tracking down if you have not already had the opportinity to view it. Ronnie and Duncan exhibit it at various events throughtout the year. Margie ran a Tombola on the Sunday assisted by her mother and Bob Conner, raising over One Hundred Pounds for the Group and re-establishing this popular attraction. John Traynor opened the Tram sheds giving visitors an opportunity to see behind the scenes.

Only two cars are operational at the moment Lanarkshire 53 and Gratz 225.

- 53. As always is the favourite to operate, but does require two crew members. Good use is made of this car whenever the opportunity arises.
- 225. The workhouse of the fleet soldiers on covering the bulk of the services. We are becoming concerned about the tyre profile of this car as excessive squealing on dry days is very apparent, a clicking noise

from the truck when the car runs has also developed. A visual inspection while the car is moving has shown nothing obvious, brake gear has been inspected giving us the confidence to continue operating the car. Once 392 becomes available a more through examination and assessment will be possible.

1017. A number of defects have been found on this car. David is concentrating on rectifying the hand brake which never satisfactorily operated.

1245. No further work on this car has been done or is planned for the forcible future.

Work nights on Thursday evenings have been continuous with the exception of only a couple of weeks while David was on holiday. Flooding of the pits however, due to a major water mains failure restricted some of our activities for a couple of weeks. Work continues with the Group, assisting David, only on Dusseldorf 392 which we feel has three outstanding problems still to be addressed before we can bring it back into service:—

1. Track Brake. Some time ago the track brake was inappropriately operated and hit a set. This resulted in the loss of the brake plate. David has agreed to arrange the manufacture of a couple of replacement plates in the Park workshops.

2. Barrier separating wheelchair lift from passengers. This is a requirement imposed upon us by the Railway Inspector. Sliding doors were temporarily fitted into the end bulkheads. However, it was found this caused unacceptable restriction on the manoeuvrability of the wheelchair. Investigation on fitting a barrier within the passenger saloon is ongoing.

3. Low voltage electrical equipment. The car sustained damage to the control panels during its attack by vandals and also had to endure several months with only basic protection from the elements. Last week, we connected batteries, temporarily for the first time and were delighted to find most of the low voltage circuits operational. Further testing will have to be done over the next few weeks. However, it is looking good. Unfortunately a fault has been identified with the wheelchair lift which will probably have to be looked at by the supplier as we do not wish to invalidate gaurantees.

Once the above work has been undertaken and minor jobs, such as fitting wheelchair clamps, the car may be ready for initial service.

However, considerable work is required to improve the appearance of the body-work which deteriorated while stored outside.

#### NOT ENOUGH VOLUNTEERS

Work is required on all cars; however at this time we do not have enough active volunteers to tackle outstanding work on the rest of the fleet other than cleaning, which Andy has undertaken. For example the ivory paintwork on 53 has deteriorated badly over the last couple of seasons. This is one of the jobs the Group could undertake if volunteers were available.

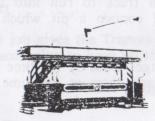

# £9.9 million to Upgrade Summerlee Heritage Park

THE SCRIBE

The Heritage Lottery Fund is giving £4.78 million to help towards the upgrading of the park. The remainder of the money will be met in the main by the Council and donations. This is great news as it will be the first major change since the park opened in 1987.

At the time of writing the plan is to develop the main hall, improve the collection, storage and re-furbish the conservation workshop. There will be a new entrance for the main hall with visitor orientation space and new facilities-cafe-shop-and toilets. The museum's collection with an increased display space will be re-interpreted. It is intended to create a link between Summerlee Ironworks and exhibits in the main hall. An education room will be provided and there will be improved facilities for schools. The refurbishment of the conservation workshop should provide income generation and training opportunities.

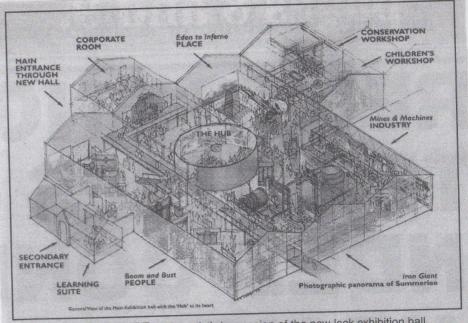
#### CLOSURE

The main hall should close to the public on 1st April 2006 to allow it to be prepared for building work to begin on the 1st October 2006. The existing cottage entrance, shop, exhibition area, offices and cafe will be vacated at a later date to allow work to start on them on 1st October 2006.

No fixed date has been made yet as to the suspension of the tramway, and we shall keep you up to date on this. We shall lose a small bit of track at the main gate to provide space for the new main hall entrance.

Tram restoration will still be able to be carried out in the depot during building work as the depot is unaffected by this. It is hoped that a spur will be taken off the main track to run into the new conservation workshop and that it will contain a pit which should make major maintenance jobs easier.

Doubtless there will be changes made by the time work starts but these are the plans as I understand them at the time of writing. Exciting times ahead for us all.



BACK TO THE FUTURE ... An artist's impression of the new-look exhibition hall.

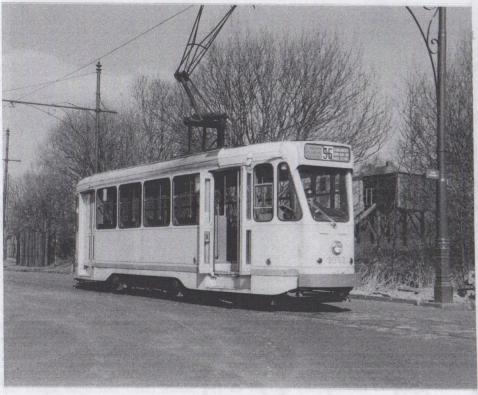
# Thank You!

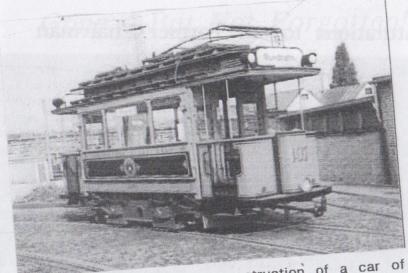


## Happy 50th to Andy Jamieson

COLOGNE CAR 407 – a reconstruction of a car of Cologne's very first fleet. The replica is based on a similar car from another source.

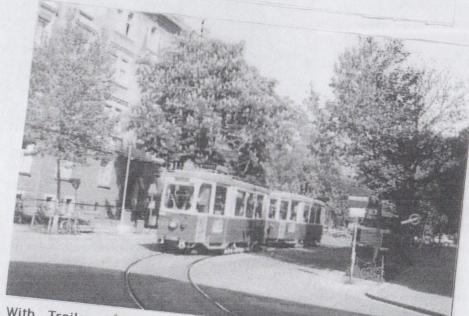

# WILLIE

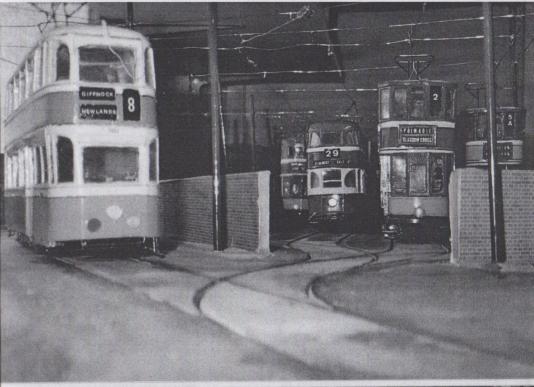
## WILSON

The photo shows Willie at the controls again after having the misfortune of loosing his left leg from below the knee last winter. However he is a keen tram enthusiast and being member No. 5 was determined to get driving again as soon as possible. He had a few runs on this event day and since it is his left leg was able to operate the Hand-brake without trouble. any Hopefully it will not be long before he is back driving again on a regular basis.

To help pass the time whilst he was

recuperating last winter and this spring Willie who is a suberb model tram builder decided to build a new "0" gauge layout in his garden shed. After some negotiations with his wife May it was agreed that she would have shelves put up to hold her garden equipment and sprays 6 feet up, whilst Willie could have shelves put up about 3 feet off the ground to run in a "U" shape around the shed to act as a base to build his new layout. Both parties happy, Willie set to work and over the months the layout started to come to life. He builds his own track and runs the trams as they should be, on a live overhead, so as you can imagine it was no small task to take on. The track has been infilled in the main with polyfiller and is predominately street running with electric points and no less that 13 dead sections on the overhead on the main double track which allows 7 to 9 trams to run at any one time. Both ends of the "U" have a turning circle and there is a permanent







way yard at the right-hand top end with 2 dead sections. There is also a large open depot or storage area as he decribes it which with its track work can hold 18 trams. It of course has no less that 15 overhead dead sections. This is placed near the bottom of the left-hand side,

The street scene that it runs through has a variety of houses and shops

plus cars, people and commercial vehicles.

Willie has built all the trams himself over the years, has a selection of various systems of trams operating, some with trolley poles, some with pantographs and others with the bow collector, so you can imagine that the overhead had to be perfect for all types of pick up to operate

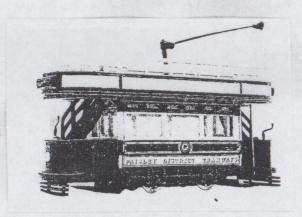
perfectly-which of course it does.

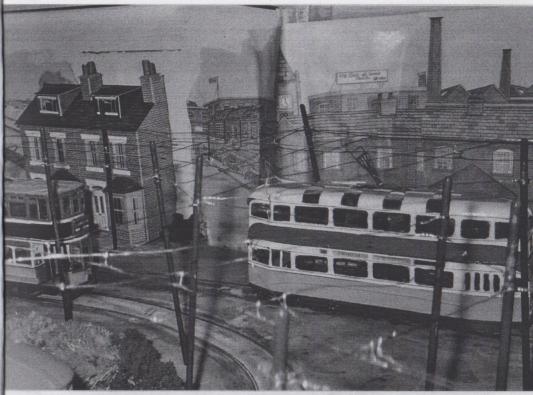
When you walk into the shed on your first visit which Duncan White and I did a few months ago it is quite simply breathtaking to see such a perfect layout running double and single deck trams in such numbers. Summerlee is represented with fine models of 1017 and 225 (in proper green) and there is a model of the Coronation 1245 but at least his runs. It is a pity in way that this is a permanent layout as it would easily outclass anything else you could see at a model railway show. Oh least I forget he has had a very intricate "00" layout in the small bedroom upstairs for many years!

As you can see he is a man of many talents and does not let the loss of part of a leg hold him down. The photos we show do not give proper

credit to this magnificent layout. Well done Willie.

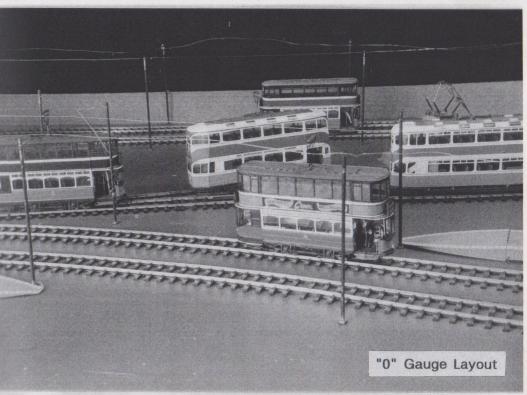
## MODEL CLUB
